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Small States & Conflict Resolution - Historical Background

- No major traditional conflicts
 - Internal disputes in the 13th century until the mid 16th century
 - Military occupation by the Allied forces in WWII and founding member of NATO
 - Cod Wars with the UK from 1958-1976
 - Various domestic political conflicts i.e. NATO membership, US Defence agreement, EEA agreement, civil unrest related to the bank collapse in 2008, Icesave dispute etc.
- Importance of vulnerability and dependence on larger states
 - Iceland has no army but has a bilateral defence agreement with the US
 - All issues relating to defence and security were outsourced
 - Since 2006 a new reality for Iceland expertise and knowledge now being built

Small States & Conflict Resolution: Historical Background II

- Expertise in peace-making and peace-keeping
 - Iceland has no expertise in traditional peace-keeping in conflict areas but has for example provided a platform for dialogue between conflicting sides – Reykjavik Summit in 1986
 - Iceland's contributions to peace-keeping missions
 - Aviation control in Kosovo and Afghanistan
 - Civil experts seconded to missions i.e. Gender expertise within NATO and in peacekeeping missions worldwide
 - Explosive Ordnance Disposal Unit from the Icelandic Coast Guard trains and supervises
 - Icelandic Coast Guard participates in patrols in the Mediterranean
 - Training of police and provided judiciary expertise and training in Balkans
 - Participation in Nordic peacekeeping mission in Sri Lanka

Small States & Conflict Resolution: Major current conflict & issues

- Current issues of conflict
 - Internal political disputes mainly relating to the EEA agreement and Iceland's relations with the EU
 - Increased tension in the Arctic at the regional level
 - Return of the US?
 - Increased Chinese economic/political interest
 - NATO concerns about its influence in the region
 - Climate change
 - Greenland and West-Nordic region
- Internally, concerns about Iceland's sovereignty prevail

Small States & CR: Defining the nature and resolution of conflict

- Political parties define the line between the contesting arguments
- Regarding EU/EEA membership
 - International cooperation vs. isolationism
 - Nationalism vs. internationalism
- Regarding environmental issues domestically
 - Rural vs. urban
- Regarding multilateral cooperation
 - Young vs. old modern vs. traditional
- Regarding the Arctic
 - Environmentalists vs. potential investors

Small States & Conflict Resolution – institutional mechanisms

- Ministry for Foreign Affairs
 - Defence Directorate (small unit within the MFA)
 - Iceland Crisis Response Unit (seconded to international organizations)
- Ministry for Justice
 - Iceland Coast Guard (250 personnel)
 - National Police Force (682 officers)
- Icelandic Association for Search and Rescue, Ice-SAR (4000 volunteer)
- International presence: IMF during the economic crash

Small States & Conflict Resolution— Institutions/Agencies

- International institutional and arbitration mechanism
 - Domestic court system
 - District courts
 - Appeal court
 - Supreme court
 - Ombudsman related to Alþingi, the Icelandic parliament
 - Regional
 - EFTA Court
 - ESA
 - International
 - Human Rights Court

Small States & CR – Bilateral & multilateral relations

- Iceland traditionally has good relations with its neighbours and allies
 - exceptions include
 - UK Cod wars and Icesave dispute
 - US leaving Iceland in 2006
 - Russia Sanctions following Crymea and Ukraine
 - Nordic states fishing disputes i.e. mackerel and not bailing out Iceland after the economic crash in 2008

Small States & CR- Societal beliefs & public opinion

- All the disputes revolve around Iceland's sovereignty in the domestic debates – and according to public opinion, sovereignty has always prevailed
- Public opinion remains devoted to Iceland's exceptionalism i.e. public opinion on the Cod Wars – Icelandic heroes defeated the British empire – limited recognition of NATO and US involvement
- Negative media coverage and public opinion of Icelandic participation in military peace-keeping missions - i.e. Kabul and Chicken street incident

Small States & CR: Challenges & Learning

- Increased tension in the Arctic leading to military buildup
- Increased presence by the US military in Iceland and visits from senior US officials
- Increased interest from China misconceptions?
- Environmental challenges related to climate change
- Challenges associated with search and rescue responsibilities in the Arctic
