


Small States International Relations and Diplomacy - Historical Background [1]



• History:

- County of Vaduz & bailiwick of Schellenberg as territories represented in imperial diet
- 1719 Principality
- 1806 (modern) sovereignty and Confederation of the Rhine
- 1815 German Confederation
- 1852 customs union Austria
- 1923 customs union Switzerland
- 1995 EEA

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy - Historical Background [2]



- Issues of scale:
 - Cooperation with neighbours & strategic partners
 - «devolving» sovereignty to some degree
 - Outsourcing certain tasks of the state
 - Focusing on priorities

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy – Priorities / focus of Foreign Policy [1]

Main priorities

- Sovereignty and independence
- Economic prosperity
- Reputation
- Safeguarding the rule of law

Main topics

- Bilateral relations with neighbouring and priority countries
- Regional policy
- European integration (EEA, relations with EU)
- Foreign economic policy (trade, financial services)
- Special relations with Switzerland and Austria
- International organisations (CoE, OSCE, UN)

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy – Priorities / focus of Foreign Policy [2]

- Mechanisms & features
 - Short ways, quick & easy communication
 - High degree of the experts' autonomy
 - Continuity & «institutional memory»: little or no rotation in diplomatic posts
 - Delegation & outsourcing of administrative tasks
 - Focusing on few interests & priorities
 - Close cooperation with partner countries & -institutions
 - International law-friendly legal tradition (monistic system)

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy – Institutions/Agencies [1]

- Main institutions of the state dealing with foreign policy
 - Prince
 - Government (Prime Minister's Office; Ministry for Foreign Affairs)
 - Parliament (Committee on foreign relations, EEA Committee)
 - Office for Foreign Affairs, EEA Coordination Unit, Embassies & Missions (8 representations)
 - Staff 40 (27 diplomatic)
 - Budget (overall, i.e. including intl. humanitarian cooperation) 43 M CHF

• Geneva: EFTA, UN, WTO

Other Countries

- Representation by Switzerland (Agreement of 1919)
- In certain cases representation by Austria depending on Agreement between Austria and Switzerland
- Particular rules for Schengen visas

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy – Institutions/Agencies [2]

- No NGOs exclusively dealing with foreign policy issues
- However, foreign policy aspects included in some NGO's work (migration & asylum policy)
- Interest groups (industry, banks, trade unions, sports associations) are linked internationally (e.g. European associations, EEA Committees)

- Consulate services
 - Essentially taken care of by Switzerland, except for countries where Liechtenstein has own embassy or mission
 - Honorary consulates in Germany, Hon-Kong, Singapore and the USA

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy - Bilateral Relations

Bilateral Relations:

- Focus on Switzerland and Austria as well as Germany given by common history and culture (language)
- Iceland & Norway: EEA
- Special case Czech Republic: history of the Princely House
- Small states: common interests & challenges
- Alpine region: common interests & challenges

• Overall criteria:

«Feasibility» in terms of manpower & finances

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy - Multilateral Relations [1]

- Historical development of Liechtenstein's multilateral relations (in its own right)
 - 1920 League of Nations: membership bid rejected
 - 1950 International Cort of Justice (ICJ)
 - 1975 Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE), now OSCE
 - 1978 Council of Europe
 - 1990 United Nations (UN); joined as smallest state, before Switzerland
 - 1991 European Free Trade Association (EFTA); member in its own right, previously represented by Switzerland since 1960
 - 1995 European Economic Area (EEA)
 - 1995 World Trade Organisation (WTO)
 - 2011 Schengen/Dublin

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy - Multilateral Relations [2]

Current main focus:

- CoE (sovereignty, rule of law, cooperation in Europe, human rights)
- EEA (sovereignty, rule of law, economic prosperity, European integration)
- OSCE (security & peace in Europe, international solidarity)
- UN (sovereignty, international solidarity, human rights)
- Regional cooperation (Interreg programmes, Conference of the lake of Constance countries and regional authorities)
- Criteria for choosing allies and alliances
 - «likemindedness» (e.g. OSCE: Canada, the EU, Iceland, Norway & Switzerland)
 - Lack of power, small size, neutrality (e.g. UN: Costa Rica)
 - Interests (e.g. financial services: Andorra or Luxembourg, depending on issue & circumstances)

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy –Diplomatic Types [1]

- Public diplomacy (state):
 - Office for Foreign Affairs
 - EEA Coordination Unit [stepping in for otherwise inexistent European policy]
 - Embassies & missions
- Use of <u>publications and reports</u> to promote foreign policy
 - Different kinds [incoherent] depending on use
 - For domestic or foreign consumption
 - Strategic or PR purposes
 - Hence:
 - German or English
 - Longer or shorter texts

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy –Diplomatic Types [2]

Economic diplomacy:

- State: mainly EEA, EFTA, WTO, but also bilaterally
- Industrial organisations, such as
 - Liechtenstein Chamber of Industry and Trade (<u>LIHK</u>): represented in <u>EEA Consultative</u> <u>Committee</u>, member of <u>Businesseurope</u>
 - Liechtenstein Bankers Association: member of European Banking Federation (EBF)

Cultural diplomacy:

- Cultural players: theatre, literature, music, academia
- Often supported by state

Sports:


- Olympic Games
- World- and European Championships
- Small States Games
- Special Olympics etc.

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy –Diplomatic Types [3]

- How does the country's size feature in these?
 - Engagement selective
 - However, strong individual engagement in cultural & sports events by society
 & individuals
 - State's help often needed (diplomatic & financial support)

Small States International Relations and Diplomacy - Societal Beliefs

- Public opinion's influence may be of relevance if seen as
 - of little interest to the country (Hague Conference on Private International Law)
 - too intrusive (Global Compact for Migration) or
 - too expensive financially or with regard to manpower (Horizon 2020)
- How do issues relating to scale affect foreign policy?
 - Restraint in engaging (UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities)
 - Preference for «outsourcing» problem/issue, if possible



Small States International Relations and Diplomacy - Challenges

- Getting to legally binding terms of international environment rather than leaving it to political instability
 - Complying with EU internal market rules rather than dependency from equivalence decisions
 - > Engagement in establishment and support of International Criminal Court
- Soft law as problem
 - Seen as «power politics hidden under a veil of law»
 - ➤ International finance and tax system: OECD/FATF and other «black lists»
- If possible: participation in, preference & support of international courts
 - These guarantee for more «level playing field» treatment
 - > EFTA Court, ECHR etc.
